Q&A with SBWCN Staff

To those who don't know - what is baby season?

We call springtime at the center baby season for one reason: all the babies! During this time of year, we care for hundreds of different species of infant and juvenile animals. Baby season is our busiest time of the year. It is a whirlwind! It can be incredibly stressful and fulfilling.

What are some types of animals you see during baby season?

We see a wide variety of different songbird species, from towhees to warblers. We also care for lots of different mammals, including squirrels, raccoons, and skunks. During this time, it is common to have animals that have been orphaned, attacked by a predator, or sometimes accidentally "kidnapped" by people who think they're in trouble.

What sort of tasks take place during a normal day?

We have to feed babies around the clock! Baby birds alone need to be fed every 30 minutes. We also have to clean every enclosure several times a day. With so many animals, the laundry and dishes never end! We have staff and volunteers working from dawn until dusk.

How will the new Wildlife Hospital impact baby season?

Once we are moved into the new hospital everything will be more centralized. Staff and volunteers won't have to run from one building to the other across the property. The bigger rooms and upgraded facilities will just make everything better for the babies too.

How important are volunteers during this season?

We couldn't do this work without our volunteers. They go on rescues, feed all the patients, and aren't afraid to get a little dirty! They put in a lot of hours and a lot of heart.

Is there anything that might surprise people about baby season?

We are not just taking care of babies. We are still caring for adult animals with varying injuries and illnesses. And it adds up – last baby season, we received over 2,000 animals!

What motivates you through the long, stressful days?

Knowing that what we do is making a difference for the wildlife in our area.
